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# HB6/712 - Deuteronomy and the Formation of Racial/Ethnic Worldviews Summer 2023 July 10-14, 9am-12pm Course Description

**PURPOSE:** This course will explore the book of Deuteronomy as well as literature focused on the formation of ethnicity and processes of racialization. Students will evaluate our own connection to ethnic and racialized worldviews while we will seek to understand what sort of community Deuteronomy is attempting to form in ancient Israel. Then, we will consider what interpreting Deuteronomy could lend to shaping the church's call to racial and ethnic justice.

<u>PREREQUISITES</u>: For MA or M.Div students taking course for advanced Hebrew Bible credit, HB500 and BIBL500 or Biblical Hebrew are pre-requisites; other students have no pre-requisites

### **COMPETENCE OBJECTIVES:**

- 1) Identify the themes and literary shape of the book of Deuteronomy
- 2) Define with some major theories of ethnicity and racialization
- 3) Compare the connections between the world of the text and the world of the reader
- 4) Integrate their own social location as ethnic/racialized subjects
- 5) Apply OT exeges is and theory we've read to contribute to the church's call to reject white supremacy

### **FORMAT AND CONTENT:**

This class meets 3 hours daily from July 10-14 during Summer session.

For on-campus students, work in the course consists of classes including lectures, discussions and small group exercises, some prepared before class. Distance students will participate through Zoom either synchronously at the same time as class (synchronous required for diploma or degree credit students), or asynchronously through recordings of class. Expectations for distance students will be spelled out in the syllabus.
