HB641 - Zechariah: Spiritual Activism for Difficult Times Vancouver School of Theology, Summer 2025 In person and via Zoom

PREREQUISITE: HB500 (Hebrew Bible I) or permission of instructor

<u>PURPOSE:</u> Apocalyptic biblical prophet Zechariah speaks hope into a changing geopolitical landscape. He calls us to act communally with justice and integrity. But he encodes the message in dream-time metaphors, symbolic performances, and intertextual allusions. Using various interpretive lenses, we will explore his message, style, and contemporary relevance.

<u>COMPETENCE OBJECTIVES:</u> Students will be expected to learn and demonstrate the ability to:

- summarize the content and styles of the Book of Zechariah
 - identify different types of prophetic oracles
 - name and use four different tools of Biblical interpretation
 - recognize characteristics of apocalyptic and eschatological literature
 - relate Zechariah's images of justice, war, and restoration to our own time
